Our tag sale was a tremendous success! We made in excess of \$6,000. Kudos to all who made this possible. Although at the beginning of the week it looked like we would be rained out, we ended up with a sunny day. Signage provided by our wonderful Admin made it clear to all why we were having the sale and many responded very generously. A huge thank you goes to all who supported it by delivering donations to the church, protecting furniture from the rain, sorting, pricing and arranging donations. Thank you also to the bakers and hot dog hawker, as well as to all who helped clean up after.

Personally, during the tag sale, I was blessed to experience one of those random acts of kindness we hear about. A young family wanted to purchase an electric guitar for their child but felt even the tag sale price was beyond their means, but they would talk it over and let us know if they could pay it. Once they stepped away from the cashier station, a man who had overheard the conversation stepped forward and paid anonymously for the guitar and I had the pleasure of informing the family. Such joy! It was that kind of day, in spite of all the work. We were blessed with good weather, a big turnout and generous customers.

Along with various other fund-raising efforts, we now have now collected over \$7,000 towards our goal of \$110,000 to fix our floor. We aren't there yet, but we have made good progress. You will be hearing about more fund-raising events shortly and the search for grants continues.

On a different note, we will again offer power and access to water to the Hartford Marathon organization when the race is run in October.

Committee Reports

Clerk's highlights from the Church Committee meeting held August 13, 2024 -

- Treasurer's report July income was \$15,898.35. Income includes \$10,000 received from the brokerage account to cover expenses. Expenses were \$17,328.17. Deficit for July was \$1,429.82; year-to-date deficit is \$6,708.78
- Investments The brokerage account saw an increase of \$57,863.61 in July. \$10,000 was withdrawn to cover expenses, resulting in a net gain of \$47,863.61. The ending balance for July is \$2,134,457.83. No changes were made to the portfolio.
- The next Church Committee meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 10, 2024 at 6:30 pm. It will be held in the kitchen area of Fellowship Hall and on Zoom. All are welcome to attend whether or not you serve on a committee.

#### Here's how it works

#### Here are some examples:

- 1) With 48 hours' notice, xxxx will make an agreed upon dinner for one/two at the cost of \$25? or \$39? (to be determined). The cook can take out the cost of the ingredients and then the remainder is deposited into the capital fund.
- 2) With advance notice, xxxx will come and work in your garden or ...for two (or 3) hours @ say \$16-18 an hour...or whatever fee you set.

Payment is then issued and turned over to Sue Larsen to be earmarked for the capital fundraising project.

#### Historian's Column

I want to step back to a time before Englishmen settled on land at Windsor to give a brief account of the history of the settlement of Windsor and an account of the history of the settlers who moved to the eastside of the Connecticut River leading to the beginning of our church.



A delegation of sachems from the lower Connecticut River Valley area went to the English settlements in Plymouth Colony and Massachusetts Bay Colony. They were seeking protection from the Mohawks west of the Hudson Valley on their west and the Pequots near Long Island Sound in exchange for land. This 1631 offer did not interest the English until the Dutch established a trading post called House of Good Hope in the South Meadows area of present day Hartford.

Only then was Governor Winslow of Plymouth Colony enticed by the River Indians' description of the Windsor land and fearful that the Dutch might claim the entire area, decide to establish an English settlement. In 1633, traders from Plymouth Colony bought land on the west side of the Connecticut River near the confluence of the Farmington River into the Connecticut from the local Indians. William Holmes and men set up the pre-cut trading post frame house/post that they had brought with them on their ship. They had sailed up the Connecticut River past the Dutch Fort and Trading Post.

The commissioner of the House of Good Hope, Jacob Van Carler was ordered to lodge a formal complaint against William Holmes and demand his departure along with a written reply. Didn't happen! So then the Dutch sent 70 men to force Holmes men out. Didn't happen! Next, the Dutch sent forces to work with the natives to establish a new trading post north of the Plymouth post. Didn't happen! This failed due to an outbreak of small pox that decimated the natives. The Plymouth traders farmed and assisted Native Americans suffering from epidemics. They offered sustenance, canoes, and guides to Massachusetts men who eventually settled in all three river towns. These first Englishmen of the Connecticut River valley

occupied this trading post continuously for four years before being bought out by settlers from Dorchester, Massachusetts in May of 1637.

In 1635, the Dorchester congregation led by Reverends John Maverick and John Warham had trekked overland to settle at Windsor. They probably traveled along the Old Connecticut Path. Most of this Native American path is known today. Some of it coincides with I 84 and other sections are recognized and mapped. This trail extends from near present day Boston to the Connecticut River. Jason Newton has lead hikes along sections of the trail and given talks and picture presentations over recent years. The Dorchester people first thought that they would locate on the East side of the Connecticut River. However, upon finding that the flat land near the river was prone to flooding, the decision was made to build on the west side.

Next month, I will talk about the settlement of Matianuck that was later re-named Windsor.

## Capital Fundraising, continued: Cans and bottles recycling drive



Redemption of soda cans and bottles has now increased to \$.10 each. Also, juice bottles have been added to the list. Look for the **CTRV** designation. Cans containing alcohol such as hard ciders are not accepted at the redemption center. Glass bottles must be placed in their original container (e.g. beer) or a box. Cans and plastic must be separated. There are boxes just outside the kitchen for the soda cans and plastic bottles.

Check the roadsides, walking trails etc. for discarded bottles and cans. We can not only raise money to repair the floor in Fellowship Hall, but help the environment.

Redemption fees of \$.10 here, \$.10 there, soon adds up to significant money. See Judy Borré if you have any questions.
